What is NVCCN?

NVCCN is a statewide effort to build a network that serves to promote, coordinate, and support locally-led conservation efforts. The primary objective of NVCCN is to promote effective conservation of Nevada's ecosystems and economic viability of Nevada's communities through grassroots conservation. NVCCN provides structure to support local, diverse stakeholder groups working to achieve conservation by incorporating best science and local knowledge through a collaborative planning and implementation approach. NVCCN serves as a bridge between various groups that are already operating at the local, state and federal levels to enhance and expand locally-led conservation efforts.

Background

The NVCCN originated in 2016. Following a state-wide kick-off meeting with more than 80 diverse participants, a series of organizational development meetings occurred culminating with the formation of the NVCCN Coordinating Group and the development of a Strategic Plan in March 2018. Each strategic element has a work committee.



Focus Areas

- I. Establish NVCCN Coordinating Group to provide vision, momentum and capacity
- 2. Support locally-led conservation efforts and bridge statewide gaps
- 3. Establish sustainable political and financial support for locally-led conservation in Nevada

Establish NVCCN Coordinating Group (CG)

 The CG is made up of 60+ individuals representing 20+ local, state, federal and non-profit agencies and organizations who provide guidance and spearhead larger initiatives to support community-based conservation efforts across the state. Participation is open to anyone.



Support locally-led conservation efforts and bridge state-wide gaps

- Assist groups currently operating across the state and support Conservation Districts focused on completing Resource Needs Assessments as a foundation for collaborative conservation planning and project prioritization/implementation.
- Identify facilitators to assist groups with organizing meetings, developing strategic action plans, and formulating goals and objectives.

Support locally-led conservation efforts and bridge state-wide gaps

- Develop a database of funding sources for project implementation and administration
- Identify & share decision support tools to help link local, state and federal conservation projects and priorities.
- Provide information sharing, networking and educational opportunities
 - Developed communication and outreach plan and products, including the launch of a NVCCN website to serve as an information repository.
 - Hosted 2 workshops to bring together representatives from NV community-based groups, encourage peer-topeer learning and networking, and connect with similar efforts in other states. May 2020 workshop was canceled due to COVID, and the June 2021 workshop will be virtual.



Establish sustainable political and financial support for locally-led conservation efforts in Nevada

Dear Nevada Collaborative Conservation Network:

As you are aware, the Nevada Legislative Committee on Public Lands spends the 18 months between legislative sessions studying policies and issues related to the management of public lands in Nevada. This interim, at several of its meetings, the Committee received compelling testimony from various members of the Nevada Collaborative Conservation Network (NCCN) regarding their community-based conservation efforts throughout Nevada.

The Legislative Committee on Public Lands overwhelmingly supports the efforts of the NCCN and voted unanimously to send this letter to encourage a Nevada policy prioritizing communitybased conservation of public lands that integrates local knowledge of natural resources. The purpose of this letter is to underscore that the Committee recognizes the importance of creating and maintaining partnerships between local stakeholders, private landowners, and vested interest groups in collaboration with federal, state, county, local, and private land managers in a shared effort to maintain thriving ecosystems, as well as the associated wildlife, communities, and economies these ecosystems support. Nevada is a beautiful state with vast expanses of public lands where natural resource policy implementation requires diverse local partnerships.

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LEGISLATIVE BUILDING

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Establish sustainable political and financial support for locally-led conservation efforts in Nevada

- Identify opportunities to secure state-wide funding for implementation and administration of locally-led conservation projects. Various NVCCN partners provided testimony for the following 2019 Bills:
 - SB96 provide \$500k in state funding for federal match for conservation efforts. This Bill did not pass; however, SB 489 (State Grant Program to establish matching funds) did move forward. Although not specific to conservation activities, could still meet need if funded.
 - AB84 reauthorization of Q1 funds.
- Work with Nevada System of Higher Education and Board of Regents to bring additional capacity to local groups
 - NVCCN provided letter regarding importance of understanding, prioritizing and assisting communitybased conservation in hiring of Extension Agents
 - NVCCN is working with UNR staff to develop curriculum to support facilitation and implementation of community-based conservation efforts

Future Goals

Maintain & Expand Group

 By 2021, plan to hire NVCCN coordinator to help manage the group and associated work groups, expand participation, assist with logistics, broadly share information and lessons learned, and build local capacity to move NVCCN and NV collaborative community-based conservation efforts forward.
